But of course, catastrophes cannot be avoided and that is why emergency care must be provided efficiently and, above all, quickly. Even now, in times of COVID-19, it is mostly children who are suffering the most and need our support. Once again, it is a matter of protecting children from hunger, disease, violence, human trafficking, exploitation and abuse – providing them with medical care, education, and attention so that they can be children and develop their potential.

To achieve all these goals, we need you more than ever, because only through teamwork can we give these children a future. Give them hope, especially now.

# **Goals**

Wars, natural disasters, hunger crises and epidemics threaten lives - both acutely and through long-term consequences, especially for children. Our emergency aid is aimed at:

- Strengthening resilience to disasters through protective and preventive measures
- · Access to food, clean water, medical care and shelter
- · Protection against physical and psychological injury, abuse, exploitation, radicalization
- Preventing school drop-outs, securing livelihoods, prospects for the future

## **Missions**

Thanks to generous donors, World Vision Switzerland was able to support 1,350,245 emergency and disaster victims in 2019 in 16 projects. The most important are:

- Emergency relief after the tropical storm in southern Africa and earthquakes in Indonesia
- Emergency aid for the malnourished in East Africa due to conflicts, droughts, climate change
- Support for families in the Rohingya Refugees in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh
- Food aid in Lebanon via cash cards in cooperation with the WFP

Refugee crisis in Syria

In 2011 a brutal civil war broke out in Syria, tearing the nation apart, killing hundreds of thousands of people and forcing millions to flee. It is the biggest refugee and displacement crisis of our time.

What we have achieved

Since the beginning of the Syrian refugee crisis, we have supported over 2.8 million people in Syria and neighboring countries with food, water, sanitation, education and child protection programs.

What we have learned

- Collaboration with other organizations is more effective.
- Integrative programs prevent rejection and radicalization.
- Psychological support for traumatized children is essential for their future.

Ebola-epidemic in Africa

Ebola is a serious, often fatal disease that claimed thousands of lives in West and Central Africa between 2014 and 2016. The Democratic Republic of Congo has been fighting the epidemic since 2018.

What we have achieved

A network of representatives of trust and faith helps to warn and educate the population. In total, we supported more than 960,000 people, for example through hygiene kits and training, and by training health workers.

#### What we have learned

- Local respectable people and volunteers create trust.
- Cooperation with neighboring countries helps to contain it.
- Age-appropriate education protects children from false information.

## Earthquake in Nepal

In 2015 several major earthquakes killed 8,900 people and 880,000 houses were destroyed or damaged. In remote areas, heavy rainfall and landslides made rescue work difficult.

## What we have achieved

With water and emergency supplies we helped the homeless families. We supported villages in our Lamjung project in the construction of earthquake-proof health centers and school buildings and helped young people to receive training.

#### What we have learned

- Children are important multipliers for prevention.
- Vocational training strengthens the resilience of the population.
- Sensitization e.g. for earthquake-proof houses is an important part of prevention.



- They fall into extreme poverty because their parents have no work.
- Domestic violence and exploitation increase under the massive pressure.
- The schools are closed, there are no classes, no school meals, no friends.
- More girls are married off to relieve the family budget.

World Vision informs the population about the current situation. To reach as many people as possible, we use a network built up over the years and work together with faith representatives, for example, who are strong multipliers who convince many people. As ambassadors, children like William sensitize their friends and families.

World Vision offers psychological help to children who have to stay at home and helps them to deal with their fears. For the benefit of the children and their families, we visit them regularly with the necessary distance and use social media to sensitize parents and guardians for a non-violent upbringing. If the children get bored at home, we support them with activity packages and teaching materials.

World Vision shows the people in the refugee camps how they can protect themselves and strengthens hygiene measures. To prevent infection, we keep the necessary distance at the distribution points and limit the number of participants in activities. We support health systems by distributing hygiene products, protective clothing and simple medical material. We also provide hand washing stations and conduct hygiene training.
